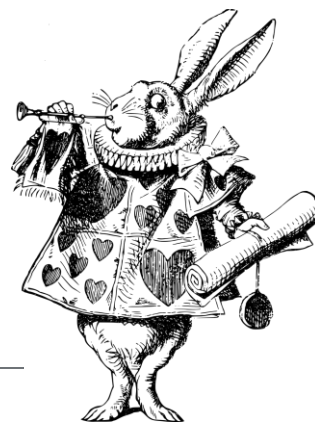

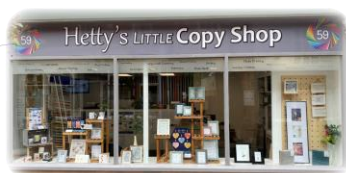

Sheep Talk...



It's been all go during the last few weeks at Heveningham and Sibton. Grass cutting for winter forage has finished for this year. We have grass coming out of ears as the ladies haven't been able to eat enough to keep it nice and short. Some grass has gone down to the Home Farm in

Essex and put in a clamp to make silage for the cows down there: it has lots of clover in it so should be rocket-fuel and very tasty. We now have the task of collecting the remaining hay bales and storing them for our ladies here in Suffolk for the winter.

With the long grass, lameness has been a big issue. The grass is long and coarse and can make the sheep's feet very sore between their toes. All the ladies have had a few days going through the foot spa and they have improved dramatically. They have also had their annual bath to help them with the biting flies, ticks and other parasites. This involves the "Dipping Man" coming with his lorry. The sheep walk up a ramp and, once on the lorry, they slide into the bath. They are submerged briefly, two or three times, before being allowed to climb out of the water and have a few minutes to stand and drip dry. This will protect them for at least six weeks.

Some of the lambs have been weaned from their mums. They have been very settled, as have the ewes, which is a sign that the ladies were ready to be rid of their babies. Some of the youngsters are as big as their mums already! More weaning is on the cards for the coming week so there are a few days of noisy sheep to come....



A month ago, I had a very freaky and traumatic incident with my dogs. Whilst we were foot bathing the sheep, I parked the dogs under a large tree for shade as it was extremely hot. Unfortunately, I didn't know that there was a bee's nest in the tree above them. The bees swarmed into the dog box where the dogs were shut in. All three dogs suffered multiple stings before I knew what was happening. I got over 30



stings myself whilst rescuing them and getting them to the river to remove the bees from their fur.

Two of my dogs were just lethargic for a couple of days. However, Jazz was not as fortunate and suffered a massive hypersensitivity reaction. She required emergency veterinary care and it was touch

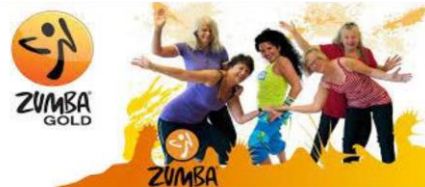
and go as to whether she would make the night. The toxins from the stings were so severe that her red blood cells were breaking down within her veins. Thankfully, after two weeks on medication, fluid therapy and TLC, she has since made a full recovery. It is something I've never experienced.

3 Villages Youth Project (3VYP) Committee



We are coming to the end of this academic year and the committee would like to thank our parents, young people, volunteers and funding partners for their hard work and dedication. We have had a fantastic year, launching two new groups, setting up a website and of course, writing lots of policies!

At the beginning of the year, we recognised the impact the cost of living was having on many of our families and launched hot meals at all of our sessions. We are incredibly proud of the success of this scheme: this year our teams have provided over 700 hot meals for our children and young people!



Although we are taking a break over the summer, we will be back in September with two regular sessions at the Hub. Starting 13th September, our Kids Club for ages 5-11 will continue every other Friday, 4-5.30pm. The following week, Friday 20th September, the Youth Club will launch, open to anyone aged 11-14. It will run every other Friday from 7-8.30pm. We currently have spaces available for both. They will be free to attend so please come along and give our groups a go. For Kids Club we have an Early Bird Service whereby we meet bus children from the Hub drop off point and sign them into Kids Club early. This service must be booked in advance by noon on the Thursday before the session. Please speak to one of the team to access Early Birds. We also run a Baby & Toddler Group at Bramfield Village Hall on Friday mornings 9.30-11am. A youth club for older teens is planned for September 2025 in partnership with the Co-op who will offer work placements, mock interviews and employment resources.

Footpath Closure



Access to the Millennium Green via Laundry Lane (at the bottom of the wildflower meadow) is currently closed while the Estate are laying a new sewer pipe and resurfacing the road to Valley Farm. This work is scheduled to be completed by 26th August when the access will be re-opened.

Do you knit?

*Have you any odd balls of yarn just sitting there?
Have you heard of Twiddle Muffs?*



I started knitting these to use up odd bits of yarn and have given them to families who are struggling with the effects of dementia on their loved ones. They really do work and offer relief for everyone. They are

knitted muffs with items attached to keep dementia patients' hands active and busy. Twiddle muffs contain strands of ribbons, beads and various fabrics attached both inside and outside. People with dementia often have restless hands and like to have something to keep their hands occupied. A twiddle muff provides a source of visual, tactile and sensory stimulation, as well as keeping cold hands warm.

If you are a knitter and would like to make a twiddle muff or two, please see the pattern below; it is very simple so you don't need to be an expert!

If you aren't a knitter but still want to support the cause we would welcome donations of wool, buttons, ribbons, or anything that could be used to enhance the muffs safely. I am currently working with Halesworth Dementia Carers to get these distributed to people who need them. More knitters mean more people will benefit. Please contact me via email if you would like to be involved in any way.

Twiddle Muff Pattern

Requirements:

- Odd balls of yarn, different textures are good for stimulation
- 6.5mm straight or 8mm circular needles
- Beads, ribbons, buttons - things that can be twiddled with but will not break and are not sharp to touch or brittle.

Instructions:

Cuff (inside): Cast on 40 stitches using two strands of double knitting wool or one strand of chunky wool. Work in stocking stitch (knit a row, purl a row) for 11 inches/28cm.

Muff body (outside): Continue in stocking stitch until work measures 23 inches/59 cm using any oddments

of various textures of wool. E.g. chunky, mohair, snuggly, eskimo, ribbon and chenille. Cast off.

Finishing and decoration: (I decorated mine before I made it into the muff as I found it easier to secure the decorations). With right sides facing, neatly sew the long sides together. Turn to right side. Push the cuff up inside the muff body and sew the two short ends together.

Decoration: Try to include at least six decorations on the outside and four on the inside. Including bits and bobs on the inside means that agitated hands can then be soothed and kept warm at the same time. Make sure everything is sewn on tight so they cannot be pulled off and there are no loose threads.

David's Column



The July Parish Council meeting was well attended and, during the 'open' session, several interesting items were raised for future consideration. One issue was that of Himalayan Balsam growing in the Carnser, close to the bridge. As it is an offence to allow it to grow in the wild this was reported to the

Heveningham Hall Estate and I am happy to report that it has already been cleared.

A second concern was the future funding of The Hub via a contribution from the precept. The Hub Trustees are planning an open meeting in August (see p 2) as a follow up to the Hub AGM to discuss the future plans, ideas and funding for The Hub. This will then be included on the agenda for the next PC meeting.

We were very happy to co-opt Sally Kline as a new Parish Councillor. We welcome Sally to the Parish Council and look forward to working with her.

Following on from the previous meeting, we have investigated the installation of a mobile phone mast in the church tower as part of our CIL spend. It has been indicated that there may not be enough demand from the village to justify the installation. However, it was agreed that a petition will be placed in the foyer of The Hub to be signed by everyone who has problems with mobile connectivity and who would support this project. We will then be able to approach potential suppliers with figures rather than speculation. The petition will be in place from the beginning of September and I would urge everyone to sign it.

Finally, I can report that the new storage shed is now in place at the back of The Hub and that the Bike Station has been ordered for installation beside The Hub, both funded from the Community Infrastructure Levy.

Nature Notes

I was recently standing transfixed in Huntingfield early one morning, watching and listening to our fantastic local Swifts. A flock of around forty were joyfully chasing each other whilst at the same time emitting their familiar



loud screams. They are dark birds with long sickle shaped wings that enable them to achieve very high speeds, in fact they can reach around 70mph, making them the fastest bird in the world in level flight.

Similar scenes will be taking place across the UK as these charismatic birds gather, prior to their migration to winter homes south of the Equator. A good percentage of the flocks at this time will be young who fledged this year. This chasing activity will help them hone their flying skills prior to their long and perilous flight south. Amazingly, they will not land again until they return to a nest in a roof next summer. Swifts feed (on insects), sleep and mate on the wing and never perch like other small birds such as Swallows.

As I stood watching them, suddenly their screams altered pitch and volume and sounded much more agitated. A second later I saw why - a Hobby had dashed in amongst the Swifts. Hobbys are small falcons that have similar sickle shaped wings and do look very much like a large Swift. They hunt in flight, catching

insects such as dragonflies and also flying birds including Swallows, Martins and, of course, Swifts.

The village Swifts certainly recognised the Hobby as a threat and all of the flock, as well as turning up

their call volume, gathered together to chase after the predator which itself then felt threatened and quickly departed the scene! The Hobby's Latin name is *Falco subbuteo*, with *subbuteo* being Latin for small Buzzard. The table football game Subbuteo, itself a hobby, is so called after the bird.

Matthew Deans, our local moth expert, completed the latest of his monthly moth trapping surveys on the Millennium Green



recently. He recorded a remarkable fifty-one species including Dingy, Scarce, Common and Rosy Footman, Poplar Hawkmoth, Scorched Carpet, Scalloped Oak, Elephant Hawkmoth and Magpie Moth. He actually caught a total of eleven Magpie Moths in just the one trap, which he said was notable as this attractive and once familiar garden species seems to be declining in much of Suffolk.

The Elephant Hawkmoth is a very colourful pink and greenish russet, quite large (c.50mm long) night flying moth that feeds on nectar from plants such as



honeysuckle. The caterpillars look a bit like an elephant's trunk, hence the name. They feed on the bedstraw wild plant that grows quite profusely on the Millennium Green.

If you would like to see some of these amazing nocturnal insects and meet Matthew, we are running a Moth Breakfast at St Mary's, Huntingfield on Saturday September 21st. See p 1 for details.

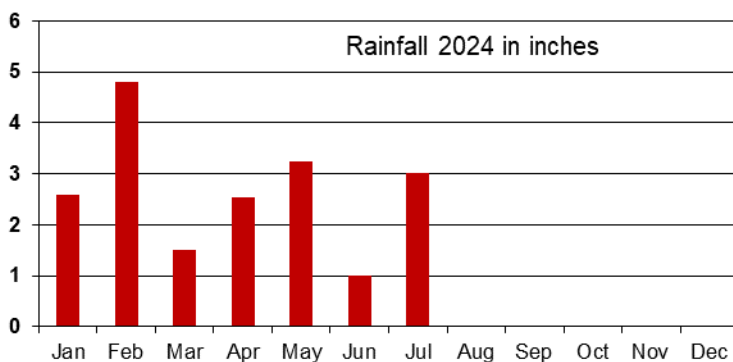

Weather report: June-July 2024



So, our disappointing summer continues, in fact déjà vu! It's been the same theme throughout the summer so far: a meandering jet stream which has, in the main, forced a succession of

areas of low pressure over or close to us and only allowing an occasional ridge of high pressure to influence our weather with warmer and more settled periods.



So, what of the rainfall? July this year has seen less rain than in the same month of 2023, in fact, 1.91" (48.5mm) less. Whereas, in June this year there was .40" (10.1mm) more than June 2023. Overall, June/July 2024 was 1.52" (38.61mm) drier than last year. Year to date we have rainfall totaling 15.70" (398.78mm) compared to 18.40" (467.36mm) in 2023. Strange as it seems though, we've had over 3.00" (76mm) less rain but considerably more cloud which I attribute to rising sea temperatures (although I could be wrong...). I suppose we will see the same sort of weather patterns for the rest of the summer, but let's at least enjoy the warmer weather while it lasts!

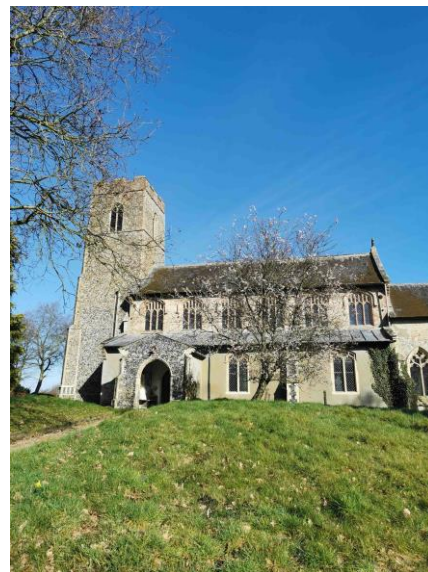

History Corner: The Laxfield Parish Hearse

In January this year the Clerk to Laxfield Parish Council received an email from the Food Museum in Stowmarket with this startling information: *We are carrying out an audit of objects in the collection at the Food Museum, Stowmarket (previously the Museum of East Anglian Life) and have recently discovered records for the Laxfield Hearse and Laxfield Bier held here. Our records state that the objects are "On loan from Laxfield Parish Council" - set up on 24.6.1969.*

According to the email the buildings used to display and store the hearse and bier were both due for redevelopment in 2024 and the Food Museum was looking to return all items on loan and find temporary storage for thousands of other objects.

Who in Laxfield knew such objects existed? The date of the loan is about the time the then Parish Council was arranging a bygone exhibition in the village hall which became the basis of our museum's collection, then put on permanent display in Laxfield Guildhall in 1970. The information the Food Museum had is as follows:

The information for this item was supplied by Mr B.G. Quinton, who used to drive the hearse when he left school at 14. It was made by his father, village builder and wheelwright, who also became undertaker just after WW1 when he made the hearse. This was originally a bier, pulled by a 'T' handle, and was converted by adding a driver's seat and fore body from an old carriage (possibly a Victoria). Mr Quinton Snr. died in 1971 aged 84.



Length of body: 7 feet
Width of body: 3 (?)
Height of body: 2 feet 11 inches
Brass Rails: 4 feet
Total length: 11 feet
Driving seat: 3 feet 3 inches x 1 foot 2 inches
Wheels: Front: 3 feet (12 spokes)
Rear: 3 feet 6 inches (14 spokes)
Shafts: 6 feet

The accompanying photograph gave rise to a lot of excitement. It is a wonderful carriage with local history attached. However, our ancient doorways and inner space were never going to allow us to house this magnificent artifact, as much as we would love to. We looked to Laxfield Church, but again, space and practicalities were against this solution. The hearse needed to leave the Food Museum around Easter and time was ticking by.

The answer arrived in the shape of an elderly resident, who, by chance, heard of the vehicle's plight and said words to the effect that she remembered it and that it was always kept in the Hearse House. Another 'Who knew?' moment. Where was the Hearse House? It transpired that it is a large shed-like structure in the local cemetery, which most residents assumed was the gardener's shed. So, now it needed clearing and cleaning – a task successfully and speedily completed by a parishoner. A member of the Parish Council had access to a suitable trailer and the hearse move was completed just before the Easter deadline.

Thus, the Hearse that very few Laxfield residents knew they had, is back in its purpose-built house. But what next? Time for research and then deciding how to



show it to the public. Initial research has found this picture and inscription in the Museum

archives: it depicts the hearse in 1935 outside the Baptist Chapel, the reins of the pony called Chips, belonging to Mr Cullingford, are being held by Edward Read, aged 80, for the fee of 6d., which was apparently put to good use in the nearby local, The Royal Oak. As is often the case, other information has started to arrive and will add to the story. Ideas such as displaying the hearse outside the museum on certain days or opening the Hearse House to visitors are currently being explored. But the hearse is now back. Who knew?
